Sgt. Arthur Ashby 574407 RAF

Arthur Ashby was a young Lancaster flight engineer who was killed when his damaged aircraft crashed into a wood while trying to make an emergency landing in France.



He and his crew were attempting to land after being attacked during a raid on Stuttgart on the night of 24/25 July 1944, his 49 Squadron Lancaster PB250 EA-J crashing into a wood near the village of Coignières, west of Paris. There were no survivors and villagers helped recover the bodies and quickly organised a full funeral service for the seven aircrew who



were buried in the village churchyard. A striking memorial to the crew of PB250 stands in the village today (pictured left).

Arthur (pictured in the crew photograph above but not identified) and his crew were on their ninth operation and had taken off from RAF Fiskerton at 2135 hours, one of 461 bombers which carried out a 'devastating' attack on the city.

His home was in Yeovil in Somerset and he was the 23-year-old son of Herbert and Florence

Ashby.

The others who died were the pilot F/O Walter Buchanan RAFVR, navigator Flt. Sgt. Philip Kitto RAFVR, bomb-aimer Flt. Sgt. Ernest Shackleton RAFVR, wireless operator Sgt. George Picker RAFVR, mid-upper gunner Sgt. Clifford Crane RAFVR and rear gunner Sgt. Ernest Greenwood RAF.
