## PO Harold John Barrons RCAF J/19345

Harold Barrons was a young Canadian mid-upper gunner who was killed along with his crew when, it is believed, his Lancaster was shot down over the North Sea during a raid on Berlin at the end of January 1944.

He and his crew were on their fourth operation with 630 Squadron and had taken off East Kirkby at 23:46 on the night of 28 January, one of twelve from the squadron joining a force of 677 bombers taking part in the continuing of Bomber Command's Battle of Berlin. Forty-six were lost, including two from 630 Squadron, the other being flown by the squadron commanding officer, W/C John Rollinson DFC.



Harold's aircraft, Lancaster JB654 LE-C, was officially listed as lost without trace but it was believed the aircraft was shot down by a night-fighter off the Dutch coast. No bodies were ever recovered.

His home was in Montreal, and he was the son of Howard Barrons, his mother having died some years before. His younger brother was serving with the Canadian Army with the 17<sup>th</sup> Duke of York's Hussars.

The others who died were the pilot PO Donald Story RAAF, flight engineer Sgt Douglas James, navigator PO Francis Peacock, bomb-aimer FO Herbert Cairns, wireless operator Sgt George Barrington and rear gunner Flt Sgt George Dove. All are remembered on the Runnymede Memorial.
