

Flt. Sgt. Herbert Eric Burton 439540 RAAF

Herbert Burton was an Australian navigator who was killed along with the rest of his crew when their Lancaster crashed into a hill in Leicestershire a month before the war in Europe ended.

He was one of six Australians and one Englishman who died when Lancaster ND949 LE-Z (*pictured below*) hit a hill near the village of Foxton, near Market Harborough, at 0310 hours on 9 April 1945 as they returned from a bombing raid on a synthetic oil refinery near Leipzig. They had been diverted due to bad weather and it was later believed either a faulty or wrongly-adjusted altimeter led to the crash.

ND949 had taken off from East Kirkby at 1800 hours the previous night for the attack which destroyed the Molbis refinery at Lutzkendorf, one of the last supplying fuel supplies to German forces.



Herbert and his crew were on their fourth operation with No. 630 Squadron after joining it in January. He came from the Bondi Junction area of Sydney and was the 25-year-old son of Albert and Helen Burton. He is now buried in Botley Cemetery in Oxford (Plot H/1. Grave 191).

The others who died were the pilot F/O Colin Richardson RAAF, flight engineer Sgt. Bernard Gibbons (who was also a qualified pilot), bomb-aimer F/O Robert Martin RAAF, wireless operator F/O William Forrester RAAF, mid-upper gunner Flt. Sgt. Anthony Bowman RAAF and rear gunner Flt. Sgt. Frederick Howlett RAAF.
