Sgt. Douglas Walter Dagger 1616793 RAFVR

Londoner Douglas Dagger was a young Lancaster wireless operator killed along with his crew on their third operation, an



attack on a key railway junction close to the French/Belgian border in the summer of 1944.

He and his crew had joined 9 Squadron at Bardney at the beginning of July. They flew operationally for the first time on 18/19 July and were killed three days later when their aircraft, PD205 WS-H, was shot down over the target, the yards at Courtrai (Kortrijk) in southern Belgium, their Lancaster crashing at in the suburb of Bissegem. There were no survivors.

The attack involved 302 Lancasters from 1 and 5 Groups and 'devastated' the target at the cost of nine aircraft lost.

Douglas came from West Dulwich in south London. He was the 21-year-old son of Walter and Dorothy Dagger and is now buried at Wevelgem Communal Cemetery.

The others who died were pilot FI/L Graham Garlick RAFVR, flight engineer Sgt. Frank Mills RAFVR, navigator F/Sgt. Kenneth Stuart RAFVR, bomb-aimer P/O John Morriss RCAF, mid-upper gunner F/Sgt. Roy Barnes RAFVR, and rear gunner Sgt. Thomas Elliott RAFVR.
