

Sgt. Thomas Alfred Elliott 1325341 RAFVR

Thomas Elliott was a wireless operator/air gunner on board one of two Wellingtons lost by 103 Squadron during an attack on Bremen on the night of 2/3 July 1942.

He was flying in Wellington IC DV611, which had left RAF Elsham Wolds at 2321 hours and was reported to be approximately 30 minutes from the target when the aircraft was apparently attacked by a night fighter.

The Wellington was critically damaged, went into a dive and exploded, blowing clear the Canadian observer, P/O David Davidner, who parachuted to safety and spent the remainder of the war as a PoW. The other four occupants of DV611, including Thomas, were killed.

Thomas, who was 22, came from the Berkshire village of Peasemore and was the son of Tom and Constance Elliott. He and his crew had flown 10 operations together before the Bremen raid.



Also killed were the pilot P/O Archie Little RAAF, wireless operator/air gunner Sgt. John Edwards and the rear gunner Flt. Sgt. Joe Chicoine RCAF. All four are buried in the Reichswald Forest War Cemetery.
