

Flt. Sgt. John McFarlane Farrell 1349742

John Farrell was a navigator by trade but was flying as a specialist wireless/radar operator who died when his Lancaster vanished on a training operation in November 1944.



He was one of 16 men from 97 Squadron who were killed on the night radar exercise over France in two Lancasters that had been among six sent out on training sorties from Coningsby on the night of 10/11 November 1944.

Their task was to use the new American-designed LORAN (long range reconnaissance) radar on board their Pathfinder Lancasters. One crashed in France, but no trace was ever found of the second, PB450 OF-D, or the eight experienced men on board. Each crew was carrying an additional radar operator and both were described by the squadron records as 'very capable'.

John came from Glasgow and was the 23-year-old son of Thomas and Margaret Farrell.

The others who died on board PB450 were the pilot Flt. Lt. John Runnacles, flight engineer F/O Wilfred Cowen, bomb aimer F/O Hugh Annett MiD, navigator WO John Crawford, wireless operator WO Harold Moore MiD, mid-upper gunner WO John Madge and rear gunner Sgt. Leonard Oldfield. All are remembered on the Runnymede Memorial.
