

Sgt. Alexander Gilmour 1060748 RAFVR

Alexander Gilmour was named after his father, who was a railwayman. He was a student in the Arts Faculty at the University of Glasgow from 1937 to 1940 and a member of the Royal Air Force Reserve. Alexander left Glasgow to join No. 142 Squadron as a pilot on 22 July 1941 and was acting Captain on Wellington bomber Z1292.

Alexander captained a crew of non-commissioned officers: Sgt. Alexander Gilmour (Captain), Sgt. John Lucking (2nd Pilot), Sgt. William Lewis (Observer), Sgt. John Saunders (Wireless Operator/Air Gunner), Sgt. Jesse Butterworth (Front Gunner) and Flt. Sgt. Frank Sumner (Tail Gunner). They flew together on their fateful first operation on 30 November 1941.



Wellington Z1292 (QT-) took off from Grimsby aerodrome at 1757 hours and was one of two of the squadron's aircraft that failed to return from this mission. Z1292 crashed at 2223 hours on 30 November 1941. The Squadron Order of Battle simply states, "This aircraft failed to return. No W/T communication at all".

Mrs Irmgard Petersen (who at the age of 4 had witnessed the crash of Z1292 in November 1941) said that she saw a burning plane at extremely low altitude fly directly at her family farmhouse. She saw three crew members in the burning cockpit. In an effort to avoid a fatal collision with the farmhouse Alex, while flying at approx. 10m, tried to evade the farmhouse and make an emergency landing on pasture behind the house but a few seconds later the plane exploded with its bomb load and crew. Five of the six-man crew were still on board; one had jumped out shortly before the crash.

News came, via the German authorities, that the crew of a Wellington that had been shot down by German Naval Artillery (coastal flak) near Kiel had been recovered and buried at the local Garrison Cemetery. After the war in Europe had finished Alexander's body was exhumed, identified and laid to rest in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery at Kiel.

On 6 October 2007 the inauguration of a memorial stone in honour of the fallen crew of the Wellington Z1292 took place in the municipality of Wildenhorst.

Alexander Gilmour is commemorated on Panel 40.
