Frederick Graham was the Canadian bomb-aimer of a No. 207 Squadron Lancaster involved in a mid-air collision with another 5 Group aircraft following a successful attack on rail yards at Nevers in France on the night of 15/16 July 1944.

He was part of the crew of Lancaster I ME807, which left RAF Spilsby at 2214 hours for the attack, part of a coordinated plan to block German supply routes to the forces opposing the Normandy bridgehead.

The attack was carried out with great accuracy and no aircraft were lost over the target.

However, on the return leg the 207 Squadron Lancaster collided with another Lancaster, from Waddington-based 467 Squadron, both aircraft crashing in flames near the small village of Lignieres-de-Touraine, near Marnay in the Loire region. The eight crew members on board ME807 were killed along with the seven in the 467 Squadron Lancaster, all fifteen later being buried in the Commonwealth War Graves cemetery in the village.

Frederick was killed on what was his 21st operation with No. 207 Squadron. He was 21 and came from the rural community of Oak Lake, on the trans-Canada highway in Manitoba. He was the son of Joseph and Amy Graham and had enlisted in the RCAF in January 1942.

The others who died were the pilot F/L George Jones, second pilot F/O Edward Dalgleish, flight engineer P/O Barrington Woollard, navigator F/O Frank Tickle RAAF, wireless operator Sgt. Joseph Fellows, mid-upper gunner Sgt. Richard Gaut and 18-year-old rear gunner P/O Michael Cantwell RCAF.
