

Sgt. Patrick Kane 1566852 RAFVR

Patrick was the son of Patrick and Margaret Kane, of Edinburgh.

He was an Air Gunner serving with 170 Squadron, based at R.A.F. Hemswell, near Gainsborough, Lincolnshire; the Squadron motto being "Videre non videri" – "To see and not be seen".

Lancaster III ME418 TC-V took off at 1653 hours 7 March, 1945, from Hemswell airfield, with 12 others from the squadron, on a night operation to bomb the jet engine factory supplying Junkers, at Dessau, Germany. Its intention was to dislocate supply lines, and disorganise the Germans. The weather for take-off was good, but very soon afterwards, due to heavy cloud, it was reported, instructions had been sent to the crews to bomb the Wanganui flares (target indicators). ME418 was shot down by a night fighter, crashing at Morsleben, near Helmstedt, in Lower Saxony, with the loss of all the crew.



Patrick is buried at the Berlin 1939-1945 War Cemetery, Germany. Coll. grave 13. G. 2-7. The epitaph reads "Though absent you are always near, still loved, still missed, for ever dear". He was 21 years old.
