


Scotsman James Lindsay was an experienced Lancaster mid-

upper gunner who died along with his crew when their aircraft was shot down by a nightfighter in Denmark following a mining operation in Kiel Bay.

He was part of the crew of Lancaster LL950 LE-Y, of No. 630 Squadron, one of 14 aircraft from the squadron sent to sow mines off the Danish east coast on the night of 21/22 May 1944. It was their 16th operation together.

LL950 had taken off from East Kirkby in Lincolnshire at 2218 hours and was homebound when the Lancaster was attacked over Denmark and crashed near the village of Vesterlund.



His name can be found on panel 063.

There were no survivors. A stone memorial *(pictured)*, marking the crash and remembering the crew, now stands at the site.

James came from the Murrayfield area of Edinburgh and was the 22-year-old son of Andrew and Margaret Lindsay.

The others who died were the pilot P/O Ronald Bailey, flight engineer P/O John Whiting, navigator Flt. Sgt. Charles Richardson, bomb-aimer Flt. Sgt. James Henderson, wireless operator F/O Albert Truesdale and rear gunner Sgt. Martin Murton.
