

Sgt Alexander Albert Brace 798553 RAFVR

Alexander was born in 1918 in St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada, the son of Eleazor Brace and Jessie Brace nee McGregor.

On the declaration of WW2, Newfoundland lacked any form of armed forces. Not possessing the financial resources with which to raise and equip ground, air, or naval forces for service overseas, the Commission of Government allowed Britain and other Allied countries to recruit men and women from Newfoundland and Labrador into their armed forces. Alexander was one of many Newfoundlanders to volunteer for service with the RAF.

Trained as a WOp/AG, at the beginning of May 1942 Alexander was posted to 101 Sqn at RAF Bourne, Cambridgeshire, from 20 OTU RAF Lossiemouth, Scotland

On the night of 8/9 July 1942 Bomber Command were tasked with an attack on Wilhelmshaven, a key naval base for the German Navy, and of a combined force of 285 aircraft 101 Sqn contributed eight crews.

Just before midnight on 8 July Alexander, operating as the Wireless Operator, and the crew departed RAF Bourn, Cambridgeshire, in Wellington III X3634 (SR-T).

At 01:40 on 9 July whilst over the target area, Alexander's aircraft was hit by 1. Luftsperr-Abteilung 206 (o) and the Marine-Flak-Abteilung 232 Battery Sande and crashed into the Innenjade, a body of water near Wilhelmshaven, killing all on board.

Alexander has no known grave and is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial, Surrey
