

Sgt. Edward Hemmings

Edward Hemmings was a young rear gunner from Stoke-on-Trent who was killed when his Lancaster crashed in Lincolnshire as it returned from a bombing raid on the night of 13 February 1943.

He was part of the crew of Lancaster W4836 PH-P, of No. 12 Squadron, which had taken part in what was the biggest raid of the war on the French port of Lorient. Bomber Command sent 466 aircraft to Lorient and its extensive U-boat facilities, and just seven were lost.

W4836 had taken off from RAF Wickenby at 1741 hours and had almost made it back home. The bomber was in the airfield's circuit when it crashed at Newhall Farm, less than three miles from the runway, killing all of the young crew members, including an 18-year-old mid-upper gunner.

Edward was the 23-year-old son of Edward and Ellen Hemmings of Hanley, in Stoke-on-Trent. He was later buried in Hanley Cemetery.

The others who died with him were the pilot P/O James Martin, flight engineer Sgt. Leonard Jones, navigator Sgt. John Reay, bomb-aimer Sgt. Robert Coombs, wireless operator Sgt. James Callanan and mid-upper gunner Sgt. Dennis Gibbs.
